Highlights from the 2022 DKG Convention

The Delta Kappa Gamma Society welcomed approximately 900 members from 17 countries to the 2022 DKG International Convention in New Orleans, Louisiana, July 12-16, 2022. The convention opened with an inspiring presentation of each member country's flag. DKG President Becky Sadowski called the convention to order and welcomed attendees. She then introduced Ted Pennison from New Orleans & Company, who surprised attendees by sponsoring a DKG Second Line Parade complete with a marching band. The parade wound through the streets of New Orleans and ended at the Sazerac House event, where members enjoyed a tour, beverage tasting, and hors d'oeuvres.

Twenty-five members from North Carolina gathered with NC DKG President Beth Winstead as delegates met for the business sessions. The general meetings included inspirations offered by members of DKGNext, information on the DKG website redesign presented by Dr. Teresa Cowan and Dr. Judy Merz, and voting on the 120 proposed amendments to

the International Constitution and Standing Rules. Doctoral graduates, including NC DKG members Dr. Shawn Clemons (Nu), Dr. Michelle Tuck Thomas (Beta Kappa), and Dr. Patricia Fecher (Gamma Kappa), were recognized with the presentation of their cords.

During the five-day convention, members heard

two keynote speakers. Courtney Clark, the "luckiest unlucky person in the world," shared her story of adaptability, resilience, and revisionary thinking after suffering a series of major life challenges. She helped members realize that detours are part of life, especially when life doesn't go the way we



plan. Clark is a business owner, author, and worldwide speaker.

Ingvi Ómarsson, an acclaimed educator, entrepreneur, and speaker from Iceland, presented five guiding principles for education. 1. Success cannot always be measured with a #2 pencil. 2. Collaboration is key. 3. Students learn by doing. 4. To be intelligent is to

be creative. 5. The purpose of education is to help us become more human and less like machines.



Ómarsson currently works for Iceland's Ministry of Education.

More than 60 breakout sessions were presented with opportunities for professional development, personal growth, expanding networking groups, and renewing friendships. Short 20-minute Takeaways were informal discussions on a variety of topics. NC DKG presenters included Dr. Angela Kern (Soul Scribbles), Dr. Teresa Cowan (Communications & Marketing), Dr. Barbara Perry-Sheldon (Editorial Board), Connie Savell (Membership), and Carol Bostian (Fine Arts Gallery). As a Membership Committee member, Connie was also part of the Celebration of Life ceremony.

Many members also participated in the DKGIEF event at Mardi Gras World, where floats are created, refurbished, and stored.



The convention closed with the installation of the 2022-2024 DKG officers. President Sadowski presented the president's gavel to incoming president Dr. Debra "Debbie" LeBlanc, and the past president's pin was given to Rebecca "Becky" Sadowski by Immediate Past President Cathy Daugherty. The evening ended with members enjoying fellowship during the DKG Society Reception and Dinner.

After waiting four years to come together to conduct Society business, members in New Orleans

The Star of the Southeast is an award presented by each president in the Southeast Region at the International Convention. The president and other elected officers select a member who has given distinguished service to her chapter, state organization, and community; who often serves behind the NC DKG President Beth Winstead (R) scenes rather than in the spotlight; and who has not served on the International Executive Board or on an international committee.

Bostian (Region X, Nu) has served as editor of NC DKG News for five years and displays a dedication to NC DKG and DKG International. While serving as the NC DKG News editor, she has created an electronic newsletter that can be viewed as a flip book, a color issue, and a black and white printable issue that chapters can mail in a standard envelope without additional postage. Carol is often found behind the camera documenting state events and meetings as well as photos of new officers, committee chairs, and award winners. In fact, when her name was announced as the recipient of the NC Star of the Southeast, she had very quietly taken up position right in front of the podium to capture the moment with the recipient. President Beth said, "I wish I had a picture of Carol's face when she realized she was the awardee." Carol has also been responsible for creating the NC DKG Convention program book and coordinating with the Membership Committee on the programs for the Ceremony of Remembrance. She has a "never say no" attitude when asked to pitch in or help with anything, whether creating workshops on communications, moving the furniture for meetings, or creating a slide template for a state officer.

Our Star volunteers twice weekly, maintains the shopper's database, and serves on the Board for Classroom Connections, a free teacher-resource store in Hickory. She serves on the Board of Directors for her church preschool. She also wrote the church faith formation lessons for grades K-5 and coordinated the Sunday morning faith education program for more than ten years.

A member of DKG since 2000, our Star served two terms as chapter president and is currently serving as chapter newsletter editor, webmaster, and membership chair. In 2015, she received NC's Golden Key Award. She has presented at numerous state conventions, attended international events, and served as communications chair for the 2019 DKG Conference in Asheville.

Coming Soon! DKG Website Redesign—User Focused, User Friendly

The current DKG websites, member and nonmember, were developed in 2014. Slight changes were made in 2017. However, the DKG Communications and Marketing Committee has heard members' frustration about navigating the website. This concern was brought to CTOG—a group that includes tech professionals at Headquarters and several members who are critically concerned with communication, including the president, executive director, administrators, Communications and Marketing chair, and Society editor.

Two key concepts drove the website redesign decisions of CTOG. The first key principle is "User Focused" - who is visiting the website, and why are they coming? The second key principle is "User Friendly" - a logical progression of topics and only four to five clicks to get to the needed information. The redesigned member site will include seven key tabs, and the nonmember site will have six key tabs.

Members are encouraged to preview the site maps and the location of topics on the redesigned site. A link to the website redesign information is available under the rotator on the DKG homepage. A feedback form is available by scrolling to the bottom of the website redesign page. CTOG is continuing to request feedback before the site debuts in late fall.

Website Compliance Forms Due



Does your chapter have a website that is linked to the DKG and NC DKG sites? Website compliance renewal is mandatory at the beginning of every biennium. The window for completing Form 72 (Society Website Compliance Assurance) is open from August 1, 2022, through October 31, 2022. For websites being linked for the first time, the compliance form may be completed at any time.

First, chapter webmasters need to review their websites to be sure that all information is correct and up-to-date. Then complete Form 72, which is available on the international website. Go to the Forms tab → Website once logged in to the DKG site.

Upon completing the online form, International will send the new 2022-2024 Compliance Seal, usually within two weeks. This seal will replace the 2020-2022 seal.

New ROSE Award Information Available

The NC DKG Awards Committee introduced the new ROSE Award that replaces the Chapter Achievement



Award. The ROSE Award (Recognition of Society Excellence) has two levels—the Rose Bud Award, symbolic of a young rose with petals not fully opened, and the Order of the Rose Award for chapters more actively involved in DKG work. Chapters must complete at least ten of the 12 Rose Bud Award category options for recognition. Most items are standard DKG work, such as completing forms or reports and participating in NC DKG events. The Order of the Rose Award includes five categories of participation. Chapters need to complete a minimum of 25 items in the five areas in addition to the first ten in the Rose Bud Award to be recognized.

The ROSE Award is non-competitive and is meant to guide chapters in gauging their annual work. The ROSE Award document, listing the guidelines for recognizing chapters' annual work, is available on the NC DKG website. Submission will be by a Google Form that will be available on the NC DKG website by January 2023.

Awards Chair Amy White shared, "The committee was committed to making the ROSE Award something that chapters could use as a planning guide and for chapter recognition without the feeling of competition. We look forward to embracing the ROSE Award for 2022-2023."


Region VI: Doris Littlejohn, Gamma Gamma

Lucile Cornetet Award Recipient

With the help of the Lucile Cornetet Award, I had the privilege to attend professional development to learn about "The Space Age on the Space Coast" inside the Astronaut Memorial Foundation at the Kennedy Space Center in Merritt Island, Florida.

I was awarded the opportunity to hear from distinct national and local faculty from institutions. I attended lectures by Dr. Charlie Camarda, a retired astronaut who served as a research engineer, inventor, author, educator, and internationally recognized expert, and Mike Cianilli, who served as launch director at NASA for 11 years and is currently NASA's manager of the Apollo, Challenger and Columbia Lessons Learned Program.

The workshop included field trips to regional sites of historical and cultural significance, such as the Apollo/ Saturn V Rocket Center, Cape Canaveral Space Force Base, Harry and Harriette Moore Cultural Complex, and Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge. I was fortu-

nate to study the history of the Space Coast through these unique experiences and learn about the many discoveries and scientific breakthroughs made by experiments conducted by NASA and at the International Space Station.



I was honored by the invitation to participate in this workshop and equally grateful to be supported by the Lucile Cornetet Award. The experience has greatly influenced my outlook as an educator, and I look forward to sharing new ideas with students and colleagues in the new school year.
